Board Of Directors Conference Call Meeting

Monday, May 15, 2018

Call To Order

President Mark Generales convened the meeting via a conference call at 11:04 a.m.

Officers & Directors Participating

Present: Directors Marge Byrne, Myriam Lentz & Martha Smith. Vice President Gary Hudson, Secretary Renee Notes, & Treasurer Bruce Rockenstein were also present.

Absent: Directors Terry Brady, Kay Gloris & Rick Ginsburg Meeting Overview - Mark Generales

President Mark Generales stated this meeting is being conducted for the purpose of voting on two issues. One vote will be to approve an amendment to the rental proposal & the second vote will be to approve two variances for specific docks in Unit 6.

Vote On Rental Proposal

Town & River News

This vote is to approve the clarifying language provided by the Association Attorney, Richard DeBoest, Esq. This language will be included in the proposal. In brief it states all rentals must be for a minimum of twenty-eight (28) days and no less; \$100 fine per day; \$2000 maximum per twenty-eight (28) day time period.

Mark asked for a motion to approve, which was provided by Renee Notes & seconded by Marge Byrne. Mark called for a voice vote & it was unanimous, with no dissent or abstain.

Vote On Two Specific Dock Variances In Unit 6

The second order of business was to provide a motion &

approve 2 docks in Unit 6 with a variance that would allow these specific docks to be built to the lot line. The lot design & construction plans were provided to Tony Pocklington, Chair of the T&R Architectural Review Committee, & approved with neighbors on either side where applicable approving of

Mark asked for the Board to approve the variance for Mr. Galpin & Mr. Amish. Vice President Gary Hudson made the motion to approve & Secretary Renee Notes seconded the motion. Mark called for the vote which was unanimous with no dissent or abstention.

Vice President Gary Hudson asked if the Board is able to move forward with the plan for a vote of Owners June 20. Mark responded he would confer with the Association Attorney regarding time requirements. Following the meeting Mark contacted the Attorney & then emailed Board members. In accordance with Florida Statues, a 14-day notice of the meeting to vote is required. However, in accordance with Town & River ARC/DOR 30 days written notice is due. Therefore, the new vote date will be July 19, 2018.

With no further business to discuss, Mark asked for a motion to adjourn which was made by Renee Notes & seconded by Martha Smith at 11:19 a.m.



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What's Blooming At Edison & Ford Winter Estates?

Gardeners here in Southwest Florida are busy 365 days a year. Not long ago, we were in a drought and hand watering was required. Now that summer is in full swing and the daily rains have returned. our tropical gardens are starting to look their best.



Ginger plants tend to go dormant in the cooler months, but they are waking up and enjoying the hot, humid weather. The ginger families Zingerberaceae and Costaceae have many species - kind of like cousins including the edible ginger, which is used in pickled foods and sushi or grated for gingerbread. There are also ornamental gingers with fabulous large, tropical leaves and unusual flowers that look great in a Southwest Florida summer garden.

Most ginger plants prefer partial shade, plenty of water and rich, loamy soil. A good location for ginger is under a shade tree where they'll receive dappled sunlight. It's also important to give them plenty of space to grow, White ginger so space them 4 to 5 feet apart. There are some great examples of ginger growing as understory plants at Edison & Ford

Winter Estates. Interestingly, one of the ginger plants called Hedychium or butterfly ginger has an intoxicating fragrance. The Red tower ginger essential oil from






the flower is called "white ginger lily" (Hedychium coronarium). Another ginger, called pinecone or shampoo (Zingiber zerumbet) has blooms similar to pine cones. The liquid generated from its bloom spike is often called "awapuhui" and is used in hair products. Another interesting ginger is peacock ginger (Kaempferia sp.). It's a low ground cover with violet-colored flowers.

Gingers behave well with other plants that have similar growing requirements, such as Heliconia and Brunfelsia. Lady of the Night (Brunfelsia latea) is blooming heavily this time of year and has a lovely fragrance for gardeners to enjoy during the summer evening hours.

There are also several trees blooming this time of year. One of the first trees to bloom during the early summer months is the royal poinciana, or Delonix regia. There are some other trees with similar names, such as the yellow poinciana (Peltophorumdubium), or dwarf poinciana (Caeselpinia pulcherrima), but these trees are not the same species. Botanical names are very important, especially when deciding which tree you'd like for your property. While traveling

over the Edison Bridge from North Myers, look at all of the red canopies dotting downtown Fort Myers and beyond. Notice how different each tree grows; genetics are an important consideration when selecting a tree. Some poinciana trees grow straight Lady of the night flower up, while others expand like an umbrella. The flower colors also varv. Look closely at the flowers and you will notice there are yellow, orange, orangered and deep red variations. It's actually the same brown, black, red or blonde hair! A







reason people have The royal poinciana flower comes in varying shades of orange and red.

horticulturist can help you decide which tree is best for your yard, especially when selecting a species such as a poinciana.

There are also many plants that are available in hot, tropical colors. The chenille plant, or Acalphya hispid (French for caterpillar), is a vibrant red color that does well planted in a little bit of shade. At Edison Ford, there

is one growing in a large pot near the café and another much larger shrub near the Edison house. Some other plants that are at their best this time of year are the coleus and caladiums. Both of these plants come in a myriad of colors and patterns.

I hope you enjoy this time of year, and if you'd like advice on what to plant during the summer months, stop in the Edison Garden Shoppe and ask one of the horticulturists for advice. I'm sure you will find some plants that enjoy the heat and humidity as much as I do!





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Nordstrom Tomato Basil Soup And Parmesan-Garlic Crostini

Tomato Basil Soup

Serves 8 - 10

Ingredients:

- 1/3 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 5 carrots, peeled and chopped
- 1 large yellow onion, chopped
- 1 tablespoon dried basil
- 3 cans (28 ounces each) whole Italian-style tomatoes in
- 1 can (14 ½ ounces) low-sodium chicken broth
- 2 cups heavy (whipping) cream
- Kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons lightly packed fresh basil leaves, cut into fine ribbons

Directions:

1. To make the Tomato Basil Soup, in a 6- to 8-quart saucepan over medium heat, warm the oil and swirl to coat the bottom of the pan. Add the carrots, onion and dried basil and sauté, stirring occasionally until softened, 10 to 12 minutes.

- 2. Add the tomatoes, including the purée, and the broth and bring just to a boil. Reduce the heat to low and simmer, uncovered, for 20 minutes to blend the flavors.
- 3. Remove soup from the heat. Purée the soup in the saucepan using a wand-type immersion blender; or, working in batches, purée in a blender or food processor fitted with a metal blade.
- 4. Return the puréed soup to the saucepan, add the cream and place over medium heat. Warm until heated through. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- 5. Ladle the soup into a warmed soup tureen or individual bowls, garnish with the fresh basil and serve immediately with the crostini resting on the rim of the

Parmesan-Garlic Crostini

Ingredients:

- 1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1 cup (4 ounces) freshly grated Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese

- 1 1/2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 1 1/4 teaspoons granulated garlic (not garlic powder)
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 1 baguette, cut on a sharp diagonal into 3/8-inch-thick slices, each about 5 ½ inches long

Directions:

- 1. Position a rack in the top third of the oven and preheat it to 350°F.
- 2. Mash the butter, cheese, salt and granulated garlic together in a medium bowl with a rubber spatula until combined. Stir in the parsley.
- 3. Using a flexible metal spatula, spread each slice of bread with a generous two teaspoons of the butter mixture in an even layer without any "bald spots." Do not skimp. Arrange the crostini, spaced closely but not touching, on a baking sheet. The unbaked crostini can be prepared to this point up to 3 hours ahead, covered with parchment paper and stored at room temperature. Do not refrigerate.
- 4. Bake, uncovered, until golden brown, 10 to 12 minutes. Serve warm.

And that could be a recipe for disaster. To help you safeguard your confidential data, we're sharing five mistakes that most of us make when using our smartphones, along with some simple fixes that you can put in place today.

1) Not auto-locking our phones or using passwords

Most smartphone users don't password-protect their devices, making information vulnerable if phones are lost or stolen.

What Can You Do?

- Change your settings to require your phone to lock after a certain period of inactivity. This way, you'll have to enter a password to get back in.
- Set a strong PIN or password. Although having a password is the most basic form of security, it will serve as a first line of defense, giving you the opportunity to remotely wipe or track your phone if it is lost or stolen.

2) Connecting to public or unsecure Wi-Fi networks Public Wi-Fi networks pose a major security risk. Cyber criminals connected to the same network can view your activity and any information you send over the network, including usernames, passwords, account information, credit

card information, and email messages. What Can You Do?

Turn off auto-discovery if your phone has that function! If you need to go online, just use cellular data instead of connecting to an unsecure network.

3) Using out-of-date apps and software

Outdated apps and mobile operating system software leave your phone open to security vulnerabilities.

What Can You Do?

- Keep apps up to date. This mitigates risks by patching up holes that hackers could exploit to access your data. Most smartphones have an automatic update option for apps; use it!
- Update your mobile OS software as soon as you are notified that an update is available.
- 4) Staying logged in to apps that store your financial information

Although certainly more convenient than entering your

credentials every time you need access, staying logged in to Amazon, Capital One, or some other shopping or banking service provider could leave you vulnerable to some serious financial risk. If your phone is lost or stolen, you're basically handing a criminal your wallet.

What Can You Do?

Don't stay logged into apps. Clear your device's browser history regularly.

5) Clicking on links sent through unsolicited texts or emails

Cyber criminals have crossed over from the desktop to the mobile world. They now deploy their phishing attempts through text messages or emails, hoping that you'll click on their bogus links and provide them with your credentials or financial information.

Just as with your desktop or laptop, be wary of clicking links and downloading attachments on your smartphone don't do it. Viruses can infect smartphones, too.

What The Future Holds

As more of us use mobile devices to communicate and transact business, more of our information will be out there tempting hackers to steal it. Don't let your smartphone lull you into a false sense of security. Follow the simple advice shared here to help ensure the security of your personal data.



consecutive numbers, pair any number in the run, pair and quints must match." So the pair can be in the first, second, or third position and the quints must match the pair in the other two suits.

Question: Player A called for a discarded Red Dragon and exposed three Red Dragons and a Joker; Player B on her turn discarded a Nine Crak; Player C needed the Nine Crak, so first she exchanged a Red Dragon from the exposure to get the Joker and then picked up the Nine Crak for her Mah Jongg. Is that legal? Nancy

Answer: No, it is not legal! Your turn does not start until you have picked from the Wall or called for a discard, then you can exchange for a Joker, not before.

Question: When East broke her Wall, she preceded to slide the tiles she counted off for the end of the Wall to the far left of her rack. Is that where the last tiles from the Wall should be placed? Thank you, Margaret

Answer: The National Mah Jongg League's Book of Rules, shows the end tiles to be placed at the far right of the rack, just where they were before you counted off. So

now when your eye follows the Wall to the left, there will be a continuous Wall to the last tile. Note: When a player decides to break up her/his hand, not to give someone else Mah Jongg, she/he will look for the end of the Wall to determine how many more picks she/he has left. I have seen players break up their hand too soon, because they did not see any tiles to the right of East's rack!



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
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Catch The Action

Summer Snapper

By Capt. Bill Russell

When we think summer inshore fishing around Southwest Florida we generally think tarpon, snook, redfish, but seldom mangrove snapper. By no means the largest fish in local waters, but what the mangrove snapper lacks in size, it makes up in availability, tenacity, and excellent table fare.

This summer is looking to be another great one for inshore snapper fishing. They arrived earlier than expected, and in good numbers and size. What's good about snapper is they are widespread and obtainable for anglers both from shore and boat. Their diet consists of both fish and crustaceans, while a live well of shiners or pilchards is a great way to catch them, these baits aren't obtainable for all anglers. Shrimp work equally well, live works best but dead shrimp either fresh or frozen will catch plenty, as well as small shrimp tipped jigs. I have also done really well on cut bait including pilchards, herring, and ladyfish.

Tackle is important for catching the bigger snapper, not so much that you need an ultra-smooth drag and a ton of line capacity, but in the way the terminal tackle is rigged. Snapper have keen eyesight and can really get leader shy, after you catch a couple it's common for them to get suspicious. Although these guys fight incredibly hard for their size and are often caught around structure, it's imperative to go light to consistently fool them. A light rig spooled with 8 to 15 pound mono or braid is a good start. The leader and hook may be the most important factor, our inshore waters are relatively clear at times, fluorocarbon leader is nearly invisible and a huge advantage. You may



start with 20 pound but find it necessary to drop down to 10 or 12 pound to get consistent action and if using braid go with a longer leader, often 3 feet or longer.

Use a small hook; one of the biggest mistakes many anglers make is using way too big of a hook. A 1/0 or smaller circle hook is a good choice. I prefer Owner Mutu Lights; they are small, super sharp, and strong. If you are fishing an area where you can get away without adding any weight, don't, you will get a lot more action with the natural presentation of a free lined bait. If you are fishing deeper water or in strong current, use just enough weight to get to the target area; old-fashioned egg sinkers rigged so the line slides through it are a time proven method. Remember snapper don't have a huge mouth so don't use a huge bait. Also, if you get your fingers too close to that mouth you will quickly realize how they got their name.

Mangrove snapper are common in about all our inshore waters, this includes the miles and miles of canal systems, bridges, piers, oyster bars, mangrove shorelines, rocky bottom (especially in the gulf passes) and any other type of submerged structure. Some of my favorite summer snapper spots are in less than 4 feet of water. Look for structure in areas with a decent tide flow and odds are good the fish are there. In some areas like the gulf passes where the tide flow can be super strong, the best fishing often occurs over the last hour of a tide, through the slack, and into first hour of the next tide, while the current flow

What's not to like about snapper? It's the perfect fish for anglers of all ages, boat or no boat. They fight incredibly hard for their size, don't require a bunch of specialized tackle or bait and, best of all, they make for some great eating.



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Summer Gardening In Florida – It's Hot, Hot, Hot!

It's beginning to really feel like summertime in Florida and the looming question for all plant growers out there is to garden, or not to garden? While many opt not to take full advantage of Florida's



year-round growing season, others embrace the opportunity and keep the veggies going.

Of course, summer gardening here in Florida presents a bit of a conundrum. On the one hand it's hot, muggy and buggy and even a short vacation away from home can turn any garden into an unruly, weed-filled, bug buffet. On the other hand, summer is the season where many of us find the majority of our free time and a vegetable garden lends itself as the perfect project to get you outside for your daily dose of vitamin D and fresh air, while providing a bounty of produce along the way.

So if you care to brave the heat, here are a few vegetables (and fruits) that are capable of withstanding, and even thriving in the summer sun:

- Sweet Potato. These sweet and starchy tubers can be planted well into July here in Florida and they couldn't be easier to grow. Loosen up the soil, being sure to give them ample room, plant the slips, and watch them spread. You can also make sweet potato slips.
- **Peppers.** Bell, hot, and sweet pepper varieties all grow well during the summer. Choose your favorites and give them a try. You can also plant a few of your hot peppers in a pot and enjoy their heat for years to come.
- **Roselle.** This species of hibiscus is native to West Africa and a truly beautiful addition to any summer garden. A tasty, tangy drink, similar to red zinger tea, can be made from the calyxes.
- Lima Or Butter Beans. There are both bush and pole varieties from which to choose. High in protein, low in fat and prolific growers, these legumes make an excellent addition to any summer garden.
- Cowpeas. Another resilient and prolific crop, these legumes can withstand extreme heat, harsh drought, and grow in the sandiest of Florida's soil. Besides being high in protein, cowpeas also have the ability to fix atmospheric nitrogen which brings nutrients to the soil. You may even consider allowing them to

take over your garden completely to amend your soil for fall planting.

- Small Cherry Tomatoes. Many gardeners try to grow larger tomatoes in the summer. But the plants simply end up producing plenty in bush but little in fruit. The truth is that larger tomato varieties need cooler nights to produce an abundance of fruit, which the Florida climate simply doesn't facilitate. However, several types of cherry tomatoes can be grown throughout the summer and be plenty productive.
- Okra. This pod producing plant is easy to grow and can be planted late into the summer. Cooking okra is almost as easy as it is to grow. Simply slice the pods and sauté them up in your favorite oil. Or cook them whole and they won't get near as slimy.

With such ease, no wonder okra is a staple of Southern cuisine!

• Cassava. Plant some now and you'll have delicious roots that will be ready to boil, mash, fry, or add into a stew by the time fall rolls around. How cool it will be to show up to Thanksgiving dinner with an exotic dish like mashed cassava! You'll need to find someone with root cuttings, but even smaller slivers will root and grow.

These are only some of the veggies you can plant this summer. If you care to do some of your own research and find more, look for plants that are native to regions of Central America, northern South America and the Caribbean, and parts of Central Africa, and Southeast Asia. Now get out there, enjoy the summer sun, and happy planting!

Seeing Is Believing When It Comes To Road Safety

- Replace wiper blades if they show cracking or if they

chatter or streak when operating. Don't forget to check the rear wiper blade.

- When in doubt, turn your lights on to help you see and help other drivers see you. Some places even have laws that require headlights to be on when windshield wipers are operating.
- Don't overdrive your headlights. Maintain a speed that will let you stop within the illuminated area; otherwise, you create a blind crash zone in front of your vehicle.
