Minutes Of July 19, 2018 Deeds Of Restriction Meetings For Short-Term Rental Amendments

Because Town & River has three active Deeds of Restrictions (DOR), three separate meetings were held at Cypress Lake Methodist Church on Thursday, July 19, 2018.

Unit 6 was the first meeting called to order at 6:35 p.m.; adjourned 6:47 p.m. A quorum was established. To amend the DOR, Unit 6 DOR requires approval of 50% of lot owners voting either in person or by proxy properly submitted to association's law firm in the stamped, pre-addressed envelope provided to the lot owners. Although there were more "yes" than "no" votes, because less than 50% of lot owners voted "yes" on the proposed rental amendment, a motion was made by Mark Generales to continue, as provided by law, the meeting within 90 days of July 19. Terry Brady seconded the motion. Continuing the meeting will allow more lot owners to vote.

Unit 11 was the second meeting called to order at 6:52 p.m.; adjourned 6:59 p.m. A quorum was established. To amend the DOR, the Unit 11 DOR requires approval of 50% of lot owners voting either in person or by proxy properly submitted to association's law firm in the stamped, preaddressed envelope provided to the lot owners. Although there were more "yes" than "no" votes, the percentage of lot owners voting "yes" was on the cusp of the percentage necessary to pass the amendment. A motion was made by Dawn Storrs to continue meeting within 90 days of July 19. Margaret Byrne seconded the motion. Continuing the meeting will allow more lot owners to vote.

The third meeting called to order was for those property units in the Amended, Restated, and Combined Deeds of Restriction [ARCDOR]. Meeting was called to order at

7:01 p.m.; adjourned 7:37 p.m. A quorum was established. The ARCDOR amendment passed by the required twothirds of property owners present in person or by proxy properly submitted to association's law firm in the stamped, pre-addressed envelope provided to the lot owners. The ARCDOR rental amendment will be recorded with Lee County and will be enforceable one year from date of recording.

Lot owners in Units 6 & 11 who did not vote on July 19 either in person or by properly submitted proxy will be given another opportunity to vote within 90 days of July 19. If you are unsure in which area you reside, see www.townandriverfl. com/maps. The Town & River Board is working with the association's law firm to schedule the second round of voting for Units 6 & 11. Please check website www.townandriverfl. com for updates.

Neighborhood Watch

Neighborhood Watch information meeting is scheduled during the Town & River Board meeting on Oct. 11. Peggy Lince of Lee County Sheriff's Office will present information on Town & River creating and implementing a Neighborhood Watch.

Lince will go over the Neighborhood Watch program to educate Town & River residents on what to look for regarding suspicious activity and provide suggestions and examples for neighbors to get involved. Neighborhood Watch programs teach us how to observe and report suspicious activity in our neighborhood. Learn how to make our homes safer, more secure, and less of a target for thieves. It involves neighbors getting to know neighbors, being alert to the potential of crime, and being willing to look out for each other's interest.

Neighborhood Watch is designed to ultimately involve thousands of residents throughout Lee County because strong neighborhood involvement and neighborhood unity can deter crime. The only requirements for Neighborhood Watch are

- Participants must be alert, and willing to keep an eye on their neighborhood.
 - Willingness to report suspicious activity to law
- Willingness to learn how they can make their homes more secure.
- · Watch groups must meet at least once a year, or more often as needed. Neighborhood Watch involves a cooperative effort between the citizens of Lee County and law enforcement. Crime can occur any time and anywhere; Neighborhood Watch must be in effect 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Crime hurts everyone.



Catch The Action

September Brings A Welcomed Change

Unless you spent the summer under a rock, you have no doubt heard about conditions affecting water quality in Southwest Florida. Red tide, toxic algae, excessive rain runoff, all creating over-polluted waters. It's been a tough time for sea life along our coast. Thousands of fish of all shapes and sizes perished, as well as a number of dolphins, manatee, and sea turtles. We have received a lot of local and national attention; hopefully we can find a solution to prevent this devastation from becoming a yearly event.

On the water, the hot days of summer are almost over. With the arrival of September, the end is in sight where we break out of the steamy days and transition to the cooler days of autumn. This is great news for fishing around Southwest Florida. Days will become less humid with a slight drop in temperature, after the hot days of August this will be welcome. Don't get me wrong, it will still be hot on many days, but it will become much more tolerable as the month progresses.

The summer thunderstorm pattern will begin to fade away opening the door to spend longer periods of the day on the water. Also, with less rain, the clarity of inshore waters will improve as Lake Okeechobee releases hopefully subside and salinity levels rise.

Fish will respond to the slight temperature change as they become more active resulting in improved fishing, as compared to hotter days of summer. With a drop in water temperature, you can expect them to exert more energy and feed more consistently throughout the day. Of course, it's fishing. There are days when you can't buy a bite no matter what, but your chances for success are tipped in your favor.

Offshore, as the water temperatures drop look for fish to move closer to shore in shallower depths. For the inshore angler it's a month with good opportunities. The beginning of autumn is always a great time to fish for some of our premier inshore species. As the shallower inshore water cools game fish will become more active and feed more aggressively.

Tarpon are not in the huge pre-spawn schools of spring, but there will be plenty around. However, redfish could be in large schools prowling the inshore waters. From now until the first real cold front (most likely in October) we are presented with our best redfish opportunities of the year. Large fish will gather in schools of up to several hundred and on the right day can give you a fishing experience you will never forget. Look for them moving along the shallow edges of bars as they push a wall of water and crashing any baitfish in their path. Try to get well ahead of the moving fish to intercept their path, (if you don't spook them), make a long cast ahead of the lead fish and hang



on. Most are way oversize but they sure are a blast to catch.

Larger sea trout will begin moving back into shallower water to feed; this is a great time to work a top water plug across your favorite trout flats. Plenty of larger trout will also be caught under schools of baitfish; look for birds and surface activity.

Other fish, including Spanish mackerel, sharks, snapper, jack crevalle, bluefish, pompano, permit, and cobia, to name a few, are all on the list of what we should expect to catch in the upcoming month.

As I write this we do not know what the collateral damage from the summer red tide outbreaks will be. We lost a lot of fish that's for sure; luckily the area I fish around Matlacha has not been affected as of this writing. Officials will be gathering as much data and information as possible in the upcoming months to get an idea on how severely fish stocks were damaged and if more regulations are needed in the future. I urge everyone to get involved and demand our elected officials take measures to insure a healthy future for our fisheries and environment. Mother Nature really needs our help.

In the meantime, September is a great month to spend some time on the water ahead of the busy tourist season. Hope to see ya on the water!

The Basics Of Credit Scores And Credit Reports

As consumers, we know that having a good credit score is important. Whether you are applying for a loan or signing up for a credit card, your credit score plays a major role in determining if you will be approved. Your credit score can also have a



significant impact on loan terms and borrowing costs.

What Is A Credit Score?

When you borrow money from a lender or sign a contract pledging to make payments, the other party needs to assess how likely it is that you will fulfill your obligations. Your credit score is a measure of risk that helps lenders quantify this likelihood in real time.

Credit scores also help to make the credit process more efficient. In order to make a decision about whether to lend money, a lender needs to gather a great deal of information. The credit score speeds up this process immensely by giving the lender a quantifiable measure without having to collect all the data. In addition, the efficiency of using credit scores does a lot to increase the amount of credit available, which in turn pushes down the cost of credit to consumers.

Types Of Credit Scores

The FICO® Score, created by the Fair Isaac Corporation, is the most commonly used credit measure. Although in this article we focus on FICO, you should be aware that other scores – for example, VantageScore and PLUS Score –

evaluate credit worthiness using their own methodologies.

A consumer's base FICO Score ranges from 300 to 850—the higher the consumer's score, the lower his or her risk to lenders. During the past 25 years, the base FICO Score has undergone many revisions, and the scoring methodology has evolved to account for new data points. Currently, the most widely used measure is the FICO 8 Score. (Fair Isaac has several other scores whose methodology is specific to the type of lending decision being evaluated. For instance, a bank may use a different FICO Score for mortgage lending than it does for making decisions about issuing credit cards.)

How A FICO Score Is Calculated

When a consumer obtains credit, the lender reports the information to the three major U.S. credit bureaus: Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. The information then goes into the individual's credit report, which provides the raw data used to calculate the credit score.

The credit report includes the consumer's personal information (e.g., date of birth, Social Security number), all of his or her account information, information about credit inquiries, and negative information such as bankruptcies and late payments. For calculating an individual's credit score, the FICO formula looks at five primary categories of information:

- 1. The consumer's total amount of debt
- 2. The combination of different types of accounts
- 3. The consumer's history of making payments on time
- 4. How old the consumer's credit history is
- 5. The amount of new credit applied or shopped for

Although some categories like payment history and amount of debt are more heavily weighted in determining the FICO Score, the relative importance of a category can be affected by the aggregated information in the consumer's credit report.

Improving And Maintaining Your Credit Score

Now that you understand what goes into calculating a credit score and why the score is so important, let's look at some strategies for improving, maintaining, and protecting your score. It all starts with an initial check of your credit report.

Consumers may request their credit report once a year from each credit bureau. There is no cost to request the three reports, and they can be obtained easily online through www.annualcreditreport.com.

Once you receive your reports, check them diligently for accuracy. Cross-reference them with each other to be sure that the information is correct across the three bureaus. If you find inaccurate information – especially incorrect negative information – contact the credit bureaus to dispute the data

Here are some additional tips for improving your credit score:

- Do your best to keep balances on credit cards low compared with your total available credit line. High balances can hurt your credit score.
- Create a system to ensure that you pay your bills in a timely fashion. Consistently paying bills on time will have a positive effect on your score.
- Do not move debt around to avoid payments. Work on a system to pay down debt rather than move it.
- Use credit cards, but use them properly and pay on time. Lenders want to see a track record that demonstrates your ability to manage debt responsibly.
- If you are looking to obtain a loan, shop around within a *short* period of time. If you spread your search out over a long time frame, lenders may infer that you are shopping for many credit lines rather than for just one loan.
- If you are unable to make payments, contact the lenders to try to come up with a plan. Consider working with a credit counselor to develop a strategy for paying down your debt.

 Regular Monitoring And Diligent Checking Are Key

Considering the importance of credit scores, consumers should make a concerted effort to monitor and protect the information that makes up their scores. Request your credit reports at least annually and diligently check the information for accuracy. Take pride in having a good score and enjoy the benefits that come along with it.

Mushroom-Stuffed Pork Tenderloin

Total Time: 1 hour 10 minutes **Prep:** 25 minutes **Cook:** 45 minutes **Yield:** 6 servings

Ingredients

5 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, plus more for brushing 4 slices bacon, chopped

8 ounces cremini mushrooms, thinly sliced

Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper 1 clove garlic, finely chopped

1/2 cup feta cheese

1 tablespoon breadcrumbs

 $1/2\ cup\ chopped\ fresh\ parsley$

2 pork tenderloins (2 to 2 1/2 pounds total), trimmed 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon zest

Directions

Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the bacon and cook until crisp, about 8 minutes.

Add the mushrooms, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and pepper to taste; cook until the mushrooms are soft, about 4 minutes. Add the garlic and cook 1 minute.

Remove from the heat and stir in the breadcrumbs and all but 2 tablespoons parsley. Let cool.

Soak 10 to 12 toothpicks in water to prevent them from burning. Rinse the pork and pat dry. Butterfly the pork: Make a 1-inch-deep incision down the length of each tenderloin; do not cut all the way through. Open the meat like a book

so the tenderloins lie flat.

Cover the pork with plastic wrap; pound with the flat side of a meat mallet until about 1/2-inch thick, starting from the middle and working outward. Spread the mushroom mixture over the two tenderloins. Starting with a long side, tightly roll up each tenderloin. Secure the seams with the toothpicks.



Preheat a grill to medium high; brush the grates with olive oil. Brush the pork rolls with olive oil and season with salt and pepper. Grill, turning, until a thermometer inserted into the center of the pork registers 140 degrees F, 25 to 30 minutes. Transfer to a cutting board to rest, about 10 minutes.

Mix the remaining 3 tablespoons olive oil and 2 tablespoons parsley, the lemon zest, and salt and pepper to taste in a bowl. Remove the toothpicks and slice the pork rolls. Top with parsley oil.

Note: Double the filling in the tenderloin! It's very tasty and needs more than the original recipe calls for.

Cooking option: Sear stuffed tenderloin in oil on stove. Bake in oven at 350 for 20 minutes. Let stand for 10 minutes.

Government Imposter Scams

You get a text, call, or email from someone who says they're with the government. They may claim to be a U.S. Marshal, saying you must pay a fine for missing jury duty. Or the IRS, saying that you owe thousands in back taxes. Some might threaten legal action, deportation, or arrest if you don't pay up or give them your financial information.

In other cases, it sounds less scary and more like your lucky day. The call, text, or email will say you've won a prize, the lottery, or a grant – but you need to pay some fees or taxes to get your winnings.

These are all scams. Scammers will try to make it seem legitimate. They might give you a badge number, or even

know information like the last four digits of your Social Security number. A Washington, D.C. area code on your caller I.D. also might seem convincing. But caller I.D. can be faked.

If someone calls, texts, or emails saying they're with the government and you must pay, stop.

Never send money – especially by gift card, cash reload card, or money transfer. No government agency will threaten you or demand payment this way. Don't give out your personal or financial information to anyone who calls, texts, or emails. If you sent money to a government imposter, contact the company you used to send the money (gift card company, cash reload card company, or wire transfer service) and tell them it was a fraudulent transaction. Ask to have the transaction reversed if possible.

Report it to the FTC at FTC.gov/complaint.



Four Benefits Of Donating Blood


