

Longest Homeowner In Town & River

In 1970, Jim and Arlene Kuhn built their first home in Town & River on Bal Isle Drive. Back then you could "stand on McGregor and see the river. There were no houses. The Landings and Gulf Harbour were gladiolus farms," says Arlene. The Kuhn's was the fifth house to be built in Town & River, "The families before them have all moved on," said Jim. They built a second house on Bal Isle Drive in 1975 and continue to reside there today. The Kuhns moved their four children from Crown Point, Ind., in 1970. Previous to moving here the Kuhn family vacationed in Fort Myers.

They spoke of this time like it was yesterday. Cypress Square (on the corner of McGregor and Cypress Lake) was a motel, in 1977 you could purchase a 400- by 100-foot lot in Fort Myers for \$6,500, about the same size lot on Sanibel was \$100,000. At that time the closest light was on Route 41 and Daniels; a flashing red caution light. Daniels was only paved to the railroad tracks, after that it was a dirt road.

Jim had multiple fascinating careers. After retiring from IBM he became at real estate agent with Ruthenburg, then owned a marina located under the Fort Myers bridge. The old bridge was a single lane swing bridge; opened like a door to allow the big boats through. Fort Myers Beach was a fishing community in the '70s. Jim recalls hanging a sign at his marina and a few of the locals came to give him a hand. "Everybody chipped in and

Four Ways Criminals Use Social Engineering To Scam Us

A major risk to both businesses and individuals, social engineering involves the exploitation of our very nature. Specifically, criminals use social engineering techniques to elicit feelings of fear, uncertainty, pressure, and excitement in the hope

that we will deviate from the ways we typically behave. Their goal is to gain access to our sensitive information or take advantage of us for financial gain. Here, we'll explore five ways that criminals use social engineering to scam us - and tips to avoid falling victim.

1) Impersonate An Authority Figure

People tend to comply with requests from those in authority. Knowing this, a hacker might impersonate an authority figure to pressure you to take a specific action. For example, he or she may pretend to be a law enforcement agent and send an email that claims illegal content was found on your computer. He or she would then advise you to click on a link to obtain additional details. Because you wouldn't want to be accused of doing anything illegal - and because of the

Berne Davis Garden To Be Open To Public

Free Tuesday Tours Until May

The Berne Davis Botanical Garden, 2166 Virginia Ave., Fort Myers, adjacent to the Edison Home, will reopen for Tuesday morning garden walks beginning Oct. 9 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. The tours will continue until the end of May. Admission and parking are both free; handicap parking is on Virginia Avenue; regular parking is on Larchmont Avenue, off of McGregor Avenue.

The botanical garden is a project of the Fort Myers-Lee County Garden Council, whose headquarters are at the Virginia Avenue address. It is staffed by Garden Council volunteers who will provide tours of the garden. Those viewing the garden

In order to obtain the "botanical garden" classification, it must be open to the public on a regular basis, have a listing of plants planted, have plant signing in the garden, and have an educational mission.

Many of the displays in the garden have been provided through the talents and contributions of the local garden clubs, plant societies, and other affiliates which comprise the Garden Council.

October Fishing

As the water temperatures of Southwest Florida begin to drop large schools of baitfish begin their migration south into our waters from the northern gulf. Many predator fish also are on the move south. Combined with our resident species, October presents good fishing opportunities.

You can target a specific species of fish or just get in the mix of a feeding frenzy and see what's there. Often a host of different species are ganged up on the same bait pod, it's common to catch a half dozen or more different species from one area. Don't be surprised if there are some larger fish lurking, keep a heavy rod rigged and ready for that cobia, tarpon, shark, or whatever else might make a presence. While targeting a specific species of fish can become challenging and often frustrating, taking advantage of whatever might be feeding around bait schools will give you plenty of action and fun. Plus, that elusive fish that you were targeting might just show up when least expected.

Offshore, look for bait balls from just a few feet off the beaches out into the gulf about as far as you dare to travel. Birds are the best indicator to locate the schools, watch for terns, gulls, or other birds grouped up and dipping to the water. Look for what appears as rain (baitfish) on the



water, watch for feeding activity and the torpedo shapes of mackerel skyrocketing from the water. Artificial reefs are some of the best areas to concentrate your efforts. It's common to catch king and Spanish mackerel near the surface or drop bait to the bottom for snapper and grouper.

Inshore, watch for the same key signs when over open water or deeper grass flats. Also, in the deeper water, a pod of dolphin hanging around an area is a great indicator of fish. Along shorelines and areas of shallower water you will also notice schools of nervous bait and possibly fish busting them at the surface. This is where you can expect to catch snook, redfish, snapper, and some big trout. Don't



ignore mullet schools, there is almost always something hungry and often big, either mixed in or hanging around the perimeter of the schools. Large trout and redfish look for food flushed out from the schooling mullet, and there is always the possibility of a large shark cruising around the perimeter of the schools, often in only a few feet of water. If you are a wade fisherman take note and keep your eyes open.

For much of the summer anglers up my way fishing around Bokeelia and Charlotte Harbor reported an unusual number of pompano; schools were concentrated over sand bottom along bars where shallow water meets deep water. The waters around Bokeelia and Matlacha never had any red tide issues throughout the summer. Shrimp under popping corks and small pompano jigs are the best way to cover some ground. Watch for pompano skipping in your wake to give up their location. They run in schools, if you see one there is more.

October is one of the best months of the year to fish; hopefully the red tide has cleared out with the cooler temperatures. Look for great weather plus the winter crowds have not yet arrived and expect hungry and aggressive fish. If you are fishing or just spending time on the water this is a great month.

perceived authority of the sender – you may not question the legitimacy of the message. But when you click on the link?Malware would be installed on your machine.2) Send "Urgent" Requests

A sense of urgency may cause us to rush into making decisions that we wouldn't usually make. The IRS scam is a great example of using urgency to trick people into taking ill-advised action. A con artist poses as an IRS representative and reports that, if the intended victim doesn't *immediately* provide payment information for back taxes owed, a warrant will be issued for the person's arrest. Who wouldn't want to avoid this negative consequence? To be sure, victims of this scam often comply with the request, sending precious confidential information into the hands of criminals.

return to the United States. In a situation like this, you might trust that the sender is your actual friend and feel guilty if you don't lend a hand. The result? You wire the money without doing enough to verify the sender's identity.

Tips For Spotting An Attack

Now that you understand the techniques used in social engineering, let's move on to some tips for spotting and dealing with attackers who use them:

• Be wary of any email or phone call that comes with a heightened sense of urgency and that claims to require an immediate response.

• If you get an unsolicited message or call purporting to come from a familiar organization and asking for personal information, hang up and call the entity at a number you know is legitimate or type the organization's URL directly into your browser and log in from there.

3) Exploit The Fear Of Missing Out On Something Scarce

If we believe there isn't enough of something good to go around, many of us will take ill-considered actions because we fear we'll miss out on something we want. How would a criminal exploit this tendency? He or she might send phishing emails purporting to come from Apple and claiming that, because of huge demand, only a limited number of the latest iPhone is available. "If you click on a link in the message, you *might* be able to get one. Act now!" In reality, clicking on the link could install malware on your computer or lead you to a legitimate-looking website where you will be asked to supply personal information. Then, the hacker will have your confidential information – perhaps even your credit card number and its expiration date.

4) Pose As Someone You Trust

Social engineers sometimes try to exploit a sense of trust in others, causing potential victims to feel guilty enough to provide the scammers with what they need. These crimes usually result in bigger, immediate payoffs. For example, a scammer could pose as a friend traveling overseas and email you that he or she has been mugged and needs money to • Always verify the source of a phone call or message before fulfilling a request, clicking on a link, or downloading an attachment.

• If someone calls claiming to be from Microsoft or another tech company and requests access to your computer to fix a supposed problem, it is almost always a scam! If an individual arrives at your office with such a claim, ask for identification or verify his or her identity by calling the company for which the person supposedly works.

Be Vigilant!

Because our trusting nature often prevails over our common sense, we need to stay vigilant. By understanding the human tendencies that scammers try to exploit – and the red flags that signal a potential scam – you will be well positioned to protect yourself from this growing threat.

Cilantro Lime Chicken Thighs

Prep time: 20 minutes **Cook time:** 45 minutes Total time: 1 hour 5 minutes

Serves: 6-8

Ingredients


- 8 chicken thighs, bone in, skin on
- Olive oil
- 6 garlic cloves, roughly chopped
- 1 cup dry white wine
- 2 limes, juice of
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 bunch cilantro, stems removed, chopped; more for garnish

• Olive oil

- Spice Mix:
- 1 tablespoon seasoned salt
- 1 teaspoon hot paprika
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder • 1/2 teasspoon ground nutmeg
- Instructions

Preheat oven 375.

In a small bowl, mix the spices. Pat the chicken thighs dry, and season each thigh on both sides with the spice mix. Be sure to season underneath the skin as well. Let the chicken



tablespoons of olive oil in a cast-iron skillet or French braiser. Brown the chicken thighs deeply on both sides in the heated oil. Remove from the skillet and set aside briefly.

deglaze the skillet with the white wine. Let cook to reduce and then add the broth.

Bring the liquid to a simmer then add lime juice and garlic. Now return the chicken to the skillet; and toss in the cilantro. Bring to a high-simmer for about 5 minutes or so.

Cover the skillet and transfer to the 375 degree F-heated oven for 45 minutes or until chicken is cooked through.

Remove from the oven and let sit for 5 minutes before serving. Garnish with more cilantro if you like.

are unlike most other tropical shrubs. The famous author, James Michener, described crotons in the opening chapter of his book Caribbean, as a symbol of the many shapes, sizes and colors of the people who inhabit the Caribbean Islands. Since Fort Myers has a subtropical climate, crotons have found their way into our hearts and minds and of course our gardens.

Many new Florida residents find crotons growing in the gardens around their homes and enjoy the plants for their easy care and colorful leaves. Garden centers often only carry a few varieties such as Mammee, Petra, Magnificent, Banana and Gold Dust; however, crotons have been cultivated since the 1660s, and with cross-pollination by ants - the chief pollinators of croton flowers - many mutations and unusual plants can be found.

In the Pacific Islands where crotons originated, the native islanders used the leaves as decorative adornments to crown honorable people during festivals. Crotons were first disbursed to Europe, then to the American nursery trade in the late 1800s where potted plants could be used indoors during the winter months and outdoors in the summer.

The Reasoner Brothers of the Royal Palm Nursery unfortunately, no longer in existence - had one of the first nurseries in Florida and offered many variations of crotons. That nursery is where Thomas and Mina Edison fell in love with the colorful shrubs and purchased them for their Fort Myers property. During the 1920s and 1930s, crotons were hybridized in Miami. Plant botanist, Henry Nehrling, and Robert Halgrim Sr. (the curator for the estates at the time), both understood the importance of these shrubs and lovingly cared for them. Halgrim even hybridized some crotons himself.

If you plan to grow crotons, it is important to know that they need well-drained soil, and if your yard is composed of poor quality fill material, you will need to add amendments. When choosing the spot to plant these shrubs, use the parade of colors sparingly, allowing each one to highlight an area as a specimen. Often their vivid hues are most effective when planted with subdued green foliage. They should not be planted in single file as a hedge, but given plenty of room to grow, so that each one can be fully appreciated.

I like crotons best when they are not overly pruned and allowed to attain their expected height of 12 to 15 feet. There are old homesteads near downtown Fort Myers that have some spectacular shrubs growing in their natural form. These crotons have been growing under huge oak canopies that provided enough shade for them to develop superb coloring.

Fabulous plants for entryways

Just like clothing goes in and out of fashion, plants disappear and return for their day in the sun too. Crotons have been experiencing resurgence in the nursery trade, often available through hobby growers at festivals or plant sales. The Edison Ford Garden Shoppe always has crotons for sale and many are propagated from plants growing on the property. During the summer months, cuttings of approximately 18 inches long can be rooted in a pot of soil. With misting and a little patience, roots should develop after about four to eight weeks. It's best to let the cutting grow into a husky plant before setting it directly into the ground.

Crotons are fairly easy to care for. In Florida, plants should be fertilized in the spring and again in the fall, but not during the summer months, as there is a fertilizer ban. I recommend spreading a half cup around each shrub.

As with many plants, crotons can attract some insect pests. The dreaded croton scale is a sucking-type insect that can be kept under control with a systemic insecticide applied in the spring. The plants are happiest when the temperature is between 65 and 90 degrees Fahrenheit and will drop their leaves if the temperature hovers near 30 degrees.

I think Edison would be happy to see crotons growing on the property again. If you would like to see the crotons and many other interesting plants in the Edison Ford gardens, there are a few tour options offered, including a garden tour on Wednesday at 10:30 a.m. I hope to see you there!


