Students and the larger community get exposure to the arts in such a special way through Art Under 20."

Art Under 20 was created through ArtFest's dedication to the fact the arts are essential to the complete education of our youth. Here's How


If you **own** a home/condo in Lee County:

Catch The Action

October On The Water

As we exit summer and head into the fall season, water temperatures of Southwest Florida begin to drop, large schools of baitfish make their migration south through our waters from the northern gulf. Many predator fish are on the move south as well. Combined with our resident species, October presents good fishing for a variety of species.

Expect loads of bait and bait schools over the next few months. Good amounts of bait or small fish stayed with us throughout the summer, and they will soon get reinforcements as their cousins begin migrating down the coast.

Often the best place to catch fish is around the bait, after all they are called bait schools for a reason. Here are a couple of the best ways to locate the bait: Dimpling on the surface or what looks like rain on the water is a dead giveaway when hunting for schools. Birds is another great indicator as they spend all day searching and feeding. Always be on the lookout for pelicans diving, terns, sea gulls, cormorants, and frigate birds.

Your best chance at action fishing around schooling bait is catching the same baits and fishing them alive. This requires skill with a cast net and a little bit of luck. If you know what type and size bait you are after, the depth of water, and sink rate of your cast net you are on your way. Seems like every day as I run from Matlacha into Charlotte Harbor I see at least one boat throwing a way too small and light net in deep water for large thread herrings. I won't say they will never catch any as anything is possible, but that is a lot of work for no or little reward.

Speaking of threadfins or Atlantic thread herring, they are common this month across the inshore waters and off the beaches. Fishing around a school generally results in hooking something. Sharks, tarpon, cobia, Spanish mackerel, jack crevalle, bluefish, sea trout, and others depend on the threads to keep their belly full. If the threads get too close to a shoreline, oyster bar, or structure redfish and snook are awaiting. Offshore you can add king mackerel, bonito, and possibly blackfin tuna to the list of hungry predators.

If you're not fishing the real thing or live bait, match a lure to the baits. These baits turn and flash when swimming, so a spoon, silver, or gold, is a tried-and-true bait. Plus, you can work a spoon through the water at any speed. Some fish like a slow retrieve while others need a speedy retrieve to get their attention. There are a host of lures that resemble

the baits, some are quite expensive; if toothy fish are around, expect to lose a few baits. A foot or two of light wire leader helps but cutoffs are still possible.

If fighting a shark gets your interest, toss out a chunk of fresh cut ladyfish or mullet a few feet under a float near the bait schools. Make sure you're rigged with a wire leader. Inshore, the larger sharks we hook most often are black tip, bulls, and spinners. All are great fighters.

This time of year, you could easily spend an entire day fishing while running from bait school to bait school. Some schools you will hook into a variety or fish, others a certain species, and some you will not get a bite. Fishing around these bait schools is like a box of chocolates, you never know what you are gonna get.

Check current fishing rules and regulations and stay up to date by visiting www.myfwc.com. Also, upload the Fish Rules app on your phone. It has current regulations and seasons with pictures to help identify fish.




